# **PROGRAM** NOTES

Marche Slave, Op 31 (Pytor Ilyich Tchaikovsky) is an orchestral tone poem that was published in 1876. It was written to celebrate Russia's intervention in the Serbian-Ottoman Empire War. Russia openly supported Serbia. The Russian Music Society commissioned this piece for a concert to support the Red Cross Society and benefit the wounded Serbian veterans. Russians sent volunteer soldiers to assist their fellow Slavs and Orthodox Christians. Tchaikovsky referred to the piece as the "Serbo-Russian March."

The first section is very somber sounding to resemble the oppressed Serbs by the Ottoman Empire. It uses two Serbian folk songs, "Sunce jarko, ne sijas' jednako" (Bright sun, you do not shine equally) by Isidor Ciric, and "Rado ide Srbin u vojnike" (Gladly does the Serb become a soldier) by Josip Runjamin. The second section comes in the relative major key to signify the Russians coming to the aid of the Serbians. The theme then gives way to the imperial anthem "God Save the Tsar." After a repeat of the first theme in the third section, the fourth and final section is a triumphal sound signifying the Russians marching into battle to assist the Serbians. It once again uses the imperial anthem foretelling the triumph of the Slavonic people over the Ottomans. This piece was first premiered in Moscow on November 17, 1876.

Five Bagatelles, Op 23 for Clarinet and Strings (Gerald Finzi, arr.: Lawrence Ashmore) was first premiered in 1943. It was initially written by Finzi for Clarinet and Piano, but was later arranged for string orchestra, wind ensemble, and string quartet later by various arrangers. It was first performed as a set of four movements. The fifth movement was added for the publication in 1945. The arrangement for string orchestra provides a chance for orchestral performances of

the piece with lush string writing to capture the full sound of the harmonic language. It is described as the perfect partnership between solo instrument and strings.

James Horner: Hollywood Blockbusters (arr. John Moss) is a collection of movie music made popular by James Horner as the sound of the cinema. James Horner was an American film composer who worked on over 160 film and television productions. He was best known for the integration of choral and electronic elements with traditional orchestrations. Horner was nominated for several Academy Awards while winning two for "Titanic." Tonight's medley includes Main Title-Apollo 13, Somewhere Out There, Bannockburn, My Heart Will Go On, and Southampton. All the themes represented in this medley were either nominated for or received an Academy Award.

Over the Rainbow (Harold Arlen; arr, Charles Sayre) remains to this day as the most popular and most decorated song to ever hit the cinema screen. Made popular by the all-time favorite Oscar winning film "The Wizard of Oz," Over the Rainbow was written in 1939 by Harold Arlen and sung by actress Judy Garland in her starring role as Dorothy Gale. It won the Oscar for best original song and became Garland's signature song. While collaborating with Yip Harburg on the score for "The Wizard of Oz," Arlen started to feel the pressure of not having a song for the Kansas scene in the opening of the movie. All other songs were written. The idea for Over the Rainbow was created when Arlen and his wife were taking a drive to the Grauman Chinese Theater. On their way, they drove by Schwab's Drug Store on Sunset Blvd. when he told his wife to pull over. He doesn't know why, but he pulled out his pad and started to write the manuscript for the song.



# PROGRAM NOTES continued

Raiders March (John Williams) Indiana Jones' theme was originally two songs played on the piano by the composer John Williams. After inviting Steven Spielberg to hear the two themes, Spielberg convinced him to combine the two songs into one to create Raiders March. It was composed in 1980 and has been used in every movie as the portrayal of Harrison Ford's character as Indiana Jones. The full version also includes a section of the love theme from Raiders of the Lost Ark, otherwise known as Marion's Theme. It was first heard in its entirety during the end credits of the first film.

Themes from 007 (arr. Calvin Custer) Think of all the James Bond movies and countless themes come to mind. Each of the Bond motion pictures offered at least one melody which became standard. Calvin Custer has arranged four different melodies into one masterpiece. The themes represented are: The James Bond Theme; For Your Eyes Only; Live and Let Die; Goldfinger. Paul McCartney of the famed Beatles wrote some of these familiar songs as well.

Star Wars Medley (John Williams; arr. James H. Burden) Star Wars remains today one of the world's biggest pop culture phenomena. The original film, created by George Lucas, hit screens in 1977 subtitled Episode IV: A New Hope. It was followed by Episode V and VI forming the original Star Wars trilogy. Later, Lucas returned to create a prequel trilogy consisting of Episodes I, II, and III. In total, there were nine films, collectively referred to as the Skywalker saga. All nine films were nominated for Academy Awards with wins going to the first two releases. Star Wars is the third highest grossing film of all time totaling over 10 billion US dollars.

The medley arranged by James H Burden was created shortly after the first film was made. It is comprised of many of the highlights from the films which includes themes from the Main Title and End Credits. This transcription keeps to the medium of the original score which provides exciting and soaring themes and melodies. "May the Force be with You!"

I began playing my instrument at Baytown Junior in 6th grade, in Baytown Texas.


Parents: Richard and Elena Turner

# **BSO HISTORY**

ore than five decades ago in 1967, Dr. David Corder, the esteemed founder and longtime conductor of the Baytown Symphony Orchestra (BSO), had a vision. His goal was to introduce classical music to the greater Baytown area, and he succeeded wonderfully. Dennis Eichler and then Pierre-Alain Chevalier, who both followed, continued the tradition of leading an excellent orchestra and providing the local community with classical and modern music. Now, Clarence Frank, Music Director, leads the BSO on musical extravaganzas.

It is worth noting that education played a major role in Dr. Corder's planning. Encouraging young students to study music was a key part of the program. Evidence today confirms that young people, who participate in orchestras, bands, and the fine arts, perform better as students. Moreover, orchestra programs in the schools are receiving greater support after years of decline.

The BSO is made up of musically talented local citizens. Additional professional musicians are utilized to provide a balanced ensemble for each concert. The Baytown Symphony Orchestra's operating income is derived from concert program advertising, patron donations, corporate direct and matching gifts, ticket sales, grants, and the annual fundraising gala.

# **MUSIC DIRECTOR**

# CLARENCE **FRANK**

aytown Native, Clarence Frank, Jr., has been named the 4th Music Director and Conductor of the Baytown Symphony Orchestra. He has always had an interest and ear for music as he first started singing in the church choir at 8 years old at Mt. Olive Baptist Church in Baytown. His love for music began while singing praises to God. Upon entering the 6th grade, he chose to play cello in the school orchestra at Cedar Bayou Junior School. This opportunity opened many doors to a whole new world of music as he discovered his love for classical music. He quickly developed on the cello earning spots in the all-region and all city orchestras in the 7th and 8th grade. He then started performing with the Baytown Symphony Orchestra in the 8th grade under the baton of Dr. David Corder. This was a total boost to his cello career as he entered Ross Sterling High School and immediately started leading the cello section as a freshman under the direction of Dennis Eichler and the late Karan Pitts. While in high school orchestra he won spots in the All-region orchestra for all 4 vears and the coveted Texas All State Orchestra his senior year. During high school was when he decided to teach professionally.

Maestro Frank was accepted into the School of Creative and Performing Arts at Northwestern State University in Natchitoches, LA. He received his Bachelor of Music Education Degree in 2000. While there he studied cello with Richard Rose and conducting with the late Dr. George Adams and Dr. Burt Allen. He was a member of the symphony orchestra, the chamber choir, and the Wind Ensemble playing string bass under Dr. Jeff Mathews.

After graduating from NSU, he began his teaching career in Goose Creek CISD in Baytown. He taught on both the junior high and high school



levels before leaving to pursue higher education opportunities. Maestro Frank entered Sam Houston State University in the fall of 2017 as a graduate assistant to his conducting professor Dr. Jake Sustaita. While there he also studied cello with Dr. Daniel Saenz. He graduated in May of 2019 with a Master of Music in Conducting.

In addition to his post with the Baytown Symphony Orchestra, He teaches Orchestra at Baytown Christian Academy and is also the Music Director for the Southeast Texas Choral Society, a community chorus in the area.

When not on the podium, Clarence enjoys outdoor sports and is a major Dallas Cowboys fan. He also enjoys serving in the worship ministry at Old River Baptist Church and playing in the orchestra at Houston's First Baptist Church. He also continues to freelance around the Houston area for various events.

# IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT FROM THE BSO

As we conclude the last concert of the season, we want to reach out to you, our community, with an important update.

The Baytown Symphony Orchestra was founded in 1967 as a community orchestra to bring fine music to the greater Baytown area, and to provide an outlet for talented local musicians, including student musicians. It has been an honor and a privilege to be a part of the fabric of this city for over 55 years.

Consistent with its mission as a community orchestra, the BSO has a long history of engaging Union musicians to supplement its ranks and provide players for specialized instruments when necessary. For many years, the BSO had a contract with the American Federation of Musicians Local 65-699, which allowed the BSO to utilize Union musicians at lower rates in exchange for guaranteeing employment to a certain number of Union musicians per concert, and a minimum number of concerts at which they would be able to perform. That contract expired, and the BSO has been attempting to negotiate a new agreement with the Union, consistent with the BSO's financial position and decreasing level of financial support following the COVID-19 pandemic. A common misunderstanding is that Lee College supports the BSO financially each concert. While the BSO has an educational agreement with the Lee College Music Department, Lee College does not provide financial support to the BSO for the concerts.

Although the BSO and the Union have been unable to reach a long-term agreement, the BSO remains committed to utilizing Union musicians and paying them fairly. In fact, for our 2023 holiday concert, the Union agreed to provide musicians, and the BSO agreed to pay them, at a rate higher than it had ever previously compensated them. The BSO proposed a similar arrangement for the May concert, but the Union rejected this arrangement, labeled the BSO as "unfair," and approved a strike against the BSO. These actions are regrettable, do not serve our community or our musicians (whether Union, non-Union, or students), and they undermine the very nature of a community orchestra as a place to develop future professional musicians. Even if a new long-term agreement is not reached, the BSO hopes that it can reach a mutually beneficial and sustainable agreement with the Union, and it is committed to paying Union musicians who play with it at Union scale, or as the BSO and the Union otherwise agree.

Notwithstanding the disagreement between the BSO and the Union over a long-term agreement, ultimately, our top priority is continuing to be a resource for the cultural life of this community, and we want to assure you that we are taking all steps necessary to ensure that we have the opportunity to be that. We appreciate your ongoing support and participation in the life of our small orchestra and community.
